"Apart from asymmetrical façade articulations and window band, the Ahistorical Style also found expression in façades with stacked rectangular balconies. *Downing Mansions* (1913-2), 38 Plein Street, provided evidence that experimentation with this alternative had started early. In fact, the building stood out as one of the earliest attempts at innovation and renewal in Johannesburg's architecture, and was also a milestone in the work of architect Gordon Leith. Only the bay windows, which were grouped vertically, were reminiscent of the Traditional Style. A similar method was used in the *Walter Wise Building*...and *Denstone Court* (1937), c/o Fox and Von Wielligh Street, where the bay windows already reflected the greater abstraction of the Ahistorical Style." 
FIRST WALTER WISE BUILDING:

By 1903, the *first Walter Wise Building* - the property of Walter John Wise - was situated on the 52 Joubert Street portion of the site of the current building.

SECOND WALTER WISE BUILDING:

By 1916, the above building had become inadequate for the expanding business, and was demolished to make way for the construction of a new building, i.e. the *second Walter Wise Building*. The latter building was demolished to make way for the current building. It is not clear when the 50 Joubert Street portion was developed as part of the Walter Wise property.

HISTORY:


"Walter John Wise, founder of the well-known firm of ladies' and children's outfitters whose modern premises are situated in Joubert Street, was born in England eighty one years ago. His father emigrated with his wife and infant son to South Africa in 1874, and worked for a number of years as a contractor to the railways in Queenstown. Subsequently, the family returned to England where young Wise completed his education, and it was not until 1893 that he again set foot on these shores. On the occasion of his second visit, he had reached the age of nineteen years, and during the succeeding ten years he set about learning his trade. In 1903 he founded the company which to this day (i.e. 1956) bears his name, and of which he is still the proprietor. Originally the firm operated as wholesale woollen merchants in the city and sold suit lengths to tailors. Its premises comprised a small shop situated on the same site in Joubert Street as that occupied by the present more modern and commodious building. About 1905 the Company reverted to retailing ladies' and children's wear on an entirely cash basis, which practice is continued to this day despite the widely-popularised systems of credit offered by other organisations throughout the country. In 1916 the premises were rebuilt to allow for the company's expanding business, and further rebuilding took place in 1935. This gradual expansion of the Company was undoubtedly due in no small measure to judicious buying by Mr. Wise. The Company celebrated its Golden Jubilee in April, 1953, and although Mr. Wise is still in

active control of this old-established concern, he is to-day ably assisted by his son Mr. Norman Wise." (Stark, F. [Ed.]: Seventy Golden Years...).




