CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS:

Foundation: concrete

Concrete: in foundation compose of cement, sand and stone

Plinth: polished red granite

Walls: Ground floor with polished red granite and mosaic tiles

Exterior walls: brick, burnt stock; plastered

Mortar: in walls compose of lime and sand

Interior walls: brick, burnt stock

Roof: flat; cover with malthoid

Windows: steel casement

Main Entrance: the original brass doors and furniture as indicated on original Front Elevation Plan

Verandah: cantilevered verandah

Doors: interior – Teak

Flag mast (CJMB)

two symmetrical positioned flag masts of typical Art Deco design

ALTERATIONS:

INTEGRITY:

The First Floor front elevation of the building is painted. The shop fronts are covered with roller doors, a harsh but necessary intervention against crime. The Ground Floor shop fronts are not similar to those of the original Emley & Williamson design. (CJMB)

ARCHITECT:

Emley & Williamson

(Address: 76 Market Street, Johannesburg)

"...the partnership between Frank EMLEY and Frederick WILLIAMSON from around 1920 in Johannesburg. Emley was joined by Williamson on Emley's winning the competition for the design of the Main Building (or Central Block) for the University of the Witwatersrand, the first building on the new University campus. Emley's health suffered at the time the new Main Building was being designed and Williamson was responsible for much of the work. Nine of Emley and Williamson's buildings, designed mostly in the Edwardian/Beaux Arts neo-classical style, were displayed at the exhibition of Dominion and Colonial architecture held in London in 1926, among 305 South African exhibits. Emley & Williamson were elected by the Witwatersrand Master Builders Association to design the Association's Johannesburg headquarters. Their work was widely illustrated in contemporary periodicals and in subsequent publications as being representative of a particular Johannesburg style. The practice was continued by Williamson after Emley's retirement.'

CONSTRUCTION DATE:

The Application for Approval of Plans was received by the City Engineer's Department on 18 March 1935 and approved ten months later ie. 20 January 1936. The building was completed on 6 March 1936 (as entered on the valuation roll), meaning it took two months to complete the building or construction to the building was started without approval of plans. BUILDING STYLE:

Art Deco - New York

Architectural Merit: "A Stunning building."

BUILDING TYPE:

This is a shop to street and office building. (CJMB)

ENVIRONMENT:

London House and Howard House (document BX-4) are perfect examples of the excellent Art Deco buildings of Johannesburg. The sky-line of the two buildings are dramatic and the relationship between the façades, a symphony of spectacular interplay. (CJMB)

CONDITION:

This building is neglected and needs urgent attention. All effort should be made to restore the moulded plaster name of the building as this is eroded. (CJMB)

URGENT ACTION:

The name of the building is crumbling and in need of expert restoration work. The owners of the building should be requested not to paint the building. (CJMB)
