DESCRIPTION OF PLACE:

Eight and a half storeys (including ground floor) and one basement level.

Noteworthy aspects of the building's external appearance include the reinforced pre-cast cantilevered canopy with terrazzo fascia along the whole shop frontage of the building; the buffed stainless steel window trim and polished black granite at ground level; the pre-cast coping and tabular guard rail at roof level; insite terrazzo and pier finishes and armoured cast glass spandrel panels in aluminium frame on the remainder of the building; as well as the pre-cast blocks faced with coloured glass mosaics and white ebonised division strips on the windowless corner section of the Market Street elevation.

Walls : reinforced concrete, cladded with textured panelling.

Roof : flat, concrete.

Windows: aluminium double sliding sash windows with fixed lower panes.

"Unfortunately the buildings facing Market Street have already been altered/ demolished so the value of the group on the southern half of the block is increased" (NMC letter, 16 August 1989).

The above-mentioned statement is contestable in parts, in view of the fact that the exterior of the National Mutual Life Building appears not to have been altered since the construction of the building.

PRE-HISTORY OF SITE:

The first structure on this corner stand was a corrugated iron store, erected in 1889. This was replaced by 1890 with the Goldsmiths Alliance Building, a double storey building with a balcony and verandah, hipped roof and central turret. The National Mutual Building designed by McIntosh & Moffat ca. 1904 replaced the double storey. The new building was a seven storey office building. It was designed in the Imperialistic style with neo-Baroque ornament, bay windows, large arches with groups of windows, cornice and corner turret.
