

FIRST NEDERLANDSCHE BANK

PRE-HISTORY OF SITE:

"The first Nederlandsche Bank Building (1897), 82 Fox Street, provides a good example of how a sculptured façade was used to catch the eye. The suspended bay window sections a picturesque roof silhouette with gables and skylights formed a striking entity. In fact, the street façade represented one of the purest small-scale applications of the Second Empire Style. Particularly impressing, caryatids beneath the two pediments of the windows, and the bay windows. This, together with the arched arcade of the adjacent Bettelheim Building covering the sidewalk in a way reminiscent of the Rue de Tivoli in Paris, gave this street corner a strong French flavour."
